The group was supposed to be led by the Hualien Mayor Mr. Chia-yen Wei, but a typhoon was about to hit the island right before the group's departure for the trip, so Mayor Wei had to stay behind. The other 10 members of the delegation, led by Director Kuo-Cheng Hsu and including a Hualien TV news reporter, arrived safely. On October 4 the group visited Albuquerque City Hall and was warmly received by Mayor Tim Keller, mayor's international liaison Alan Armijo, Arts and Culture Director Shelle Sanchez, ASCF President Pam Feather, ASCF board member and mayor's international business coordinator Celeste Nuñez Salcido, and ASCF Hualien Committee Chair Yu-Lin Shen. Just six months ago Mayor Keller himself led an Albuquerque Sister Cities delegation to Hualien to celebrate the 40 th anniversary of the sister city relationship, and have actually met most of the Hualien delegation members back then. This meeting thus became a small reunion! ASCF held a dinner reception at Indian Pueblo Cultural Center on the same day. About 70 people attended. During their stay here the delegation also participated in the opening events of the Balloon Fiesta, visited the Balloon Museum, experienced Sandia Peak Tramway, took a "Breaking Bad" city tour, got together with representatives from the local Taiwanese community, and enjoyed all kinds of New Mexican hospitality.

We are excited to announce that next official visit is scheduled for early June of 2025. More exact details and info will be presented at the next international Tea in January.





Our ASCF partnered with Ukrainian Americans of New Mexico and booked a free admission two hour concert performance at the Kimo Theater. Highlights from the 2024 Zambia and Africa Nations Business Rsources Matchmaking Summit by Richard Buckler, Zambia's Country Representative to Zambia


The December 4 – 6 Economic/Humanitarian Summit, held in Albuquerque and Los Angeles' Sister city of Lusaka, Zambia, had the overall theme of "Zambia Arise." Over 100+ delegates attended from both the public and private sectors: including Zambian and Chinese (non-governmental) businessmen, Minsters/Members of Parliament, Kings, Mayors, other non-profit groups, and Citizen Diplomats. Day 1 featured opening speeches by the organizers, in which I had a chance to speak about the goal of more sister cities in Africa and Zambia, emphasizing the need to focus on "investing in people." Since the Summit was touted as a business match-making opportunity, the key businesses represented were given five minutes or so to describe how Zambia could benefit. Presentations to name a few included:

- Road treatment products that could fill potholes and seal roads making them safe to drive.
- Medical services
- Microfinance projects
- Business incubators
- Agricultural development support
- · Women and Children Health initiative
- Environment protection and green energy
- Tourism partnerships (including with neighbor Tanzania)
- Cultural networking to showcase music, art, cuisine, and film

Day 2 dug down deeper into the specifics. Two snack/tea/coffee times and lunch allowed some significant networking to be done by those looking for project matches.

Day 3 first featured Her Worship Lusaka Mayor Chilando Chitangala speaking to the delegates at the conference hotel. She thanked everyone for coming to her city and looked forward to future engagement. After her opening remarks, a letter from Albuquerque Mayor Keller was presented thanking her and Lusaka for 10 years of "sister city relationships." After she was presented with some representative gifts, the delegates were free to choose from two different site-visits:

- Business, including a tour of "Zamseed," one of the important corn industry companies
- Cultural, including a tour of a community development center, and considerations for Microloans

However, from my perspective, an important trip was taken after the Summit was officially over. On Day 4 three vehicles were used to take about a dozen businessmen and organizers up to visit two cities north of Lusaka in the Central Province, namely, Kabwe and Kipiri Ngoshi. Both mayors had attended the Summit and Day 4 gave an opportunity to potential infrastructure investors to see land. What they discovered at Kipiri (hosted by His Worship Mayor Brilliant Munyeke and his key officials) was a strategic centrally located area that could become an important economic development zone. If such investment does happen, the Central Province will never be the same, which will help "Zambia Arise." Also, from a personal perspective the opportunities to network at dinner built those bridges of friendship that strengthened existing sister city relationships, as well as paved the way for new ones. For example, evening dinners at the hotel sharing dishes Chinese style brought together Deidre Gordon (our Albuquerque-Lusaka Sister City (SC) Chair), Grace Foh Amoaning (on the ground in Lusaka serving as Deidre and Dr. Bailey's counterpart), Florence Chalwelwa (Lusaka-Los Angeles' SC committee president), Her Worship Kasama Mayor Theresa Kolala, His Worship Kabwe Mayor Patrick Chishala, His Worship Kipiri Ngoshi Mayor Brilliant Munyeke, Andrew Chapuma (Royal Emissary for King Chitimukula), other friends of the above delegates, and myself—SCI Country Representative for Zambia. The memories will be life-long!

ABQ BioPark and Sasebo; Bamboo Light Displays in the Sasebo Garden for the River of Lights by Kazumi Kawakubo-Todman Chair

Every holiday season Albuquerque Bio Park holds a beautiful light show called "River of Lights." This year we opened the Sasebo Japanese Garden in honor of the sister city for the first time during the River of Light event. The beautiful Ookawa Bamboo Lights made by the Bio Park craftsmen which were originally created by the Ookawa Bamboo Lights Non-profit Group in Ishinomaki-city, Miyagi-Prefecture where the Tsunami hit and killed 75% of the students at the Ookawa Elementary School in March, 11, 2011. Three years ago they started making the bamboo lights by the people in the community to commemorate those children who were lost by the 2011 Tsunami.

I was so touched by the story and recently visited the zero ground of Ookawa Elementary School and met the main representative Mr Sato of this non-profit group. He was so pleased to hear that we made the bamboo lights to be displayed at the Sasebo Japanese Garden.


